Current Position: Distinguished Professor of Sustainable Development in the School of Public Leadership, University of Stellenbosch (Division Head: Sustainable Development) and Co-Director of the Stellenbosch Centre for Complex Systems in Transition.

Summary: I am primarily interested in the dynamics of transition from a systems perspective. The focus of my early career was transitions to democracy and urban transitions, but since 2003 my focus has been on 'just transitions' to a more equitable and sustainable world. This involves a synthesis of political ecology, political economy and complex adaptive systems within a wider metatheoretical framework drawn from integral theory, complexity theory and critical realism. Since 2012 I have been particularly interested in a theory of change that is appropriate for our times, more specifically whether radical incrementalism can be an adequate alternative to traditional conceptions of reform and revolution.

Summary research output: 20 books, 84 book chapters, 64 peer reviewed articles, 50 reports and 126 presentations.
